Dear Parents/ Carers

Happy New Year to you all! It was lovely to see so many families back last week, after a challenging second half to the Autumn Term, with the rise in Coronavirus cases amongst our community. There is some important information on page 2 of this newsletter, with some clear actions specific to our school to help us manage any further outbreaks, particularly in light of the changes to the isolation period announced this week. If you read nothing else, please do read page 2 (though I have tried hard to make the rest of the newsletter super lovely and exciting!) As you will know, transmission rates continue to be very high and remain high in schools within the County. A link to the full updated guidance is at the bottom of page 2, for your information.

We remain in class bubbles this half term but have resumed Collective Worship in Coronation Hall each week, sitting as separate classes. We will endeavour to share aspects of our Collective Worship with you on our Facebook Page each week. After school clubs begin next week, again in class bubbles.

I am pleased to be able to share some fantastic plans of what our new library will look like on page 3. We were able to forge ahead with the 'design phase' last term and hope to get a final sign-off and for work to begin this term. We need some help with painting before work begins—see more on page 3.

There is news and celebration of all of your fundraising efforts on page 4. The money raised last term was phenomenal—we can't thank you enough for your support. This money is being put straight towards an enrichment experience for the children very soon...I shall say no more for now but you'll be hearing all about it soon!

We are thrilled to tell you about a new two-year project that the school is involved in on page 4, which will once again put Learning Outside the Classroom (LOtC) back at the core of our curriculum. We have paused our visits to the Forest just for this half term, to reduce the need for additional helpers in school, as part of our Covid Risk Assessment, but will begin them again after the half-term holiday.

Every Term throughout the pandemic, I attend a multi-agency 'Managing Coronavirus in Schools' meeting. Our meeting this week highlighted that many schools in West Sussex continue to experience Covid outbreaks and rates of transmission continue to be very high. It is also clear that as guidance changes, there is further clarity needed as schools continue to manage risk.

Whilst we are mindful of this alongside our usual busy lives, I thought it may be helpful to identify a few clear actions so that we can continue to try and minimise the risk of transmission;

- If your child has Covid symptoms, they should get a PCR test. This is different from an LFD (Lateral Flow Device), when your child/ children have symptoms, a PCR test should be used. If possible, the quickest way to get a result and to help us manage an outbreak is to visit a drive-in or walk-in testing site.
- If a member of your family (such as parents/ carers) test positive, making your children 'close contacts', it is recommended that children do an LFD for seven days, whilst attending school— if they don't have any symptoms. If they have symptoms, a PCR test should be used.
- From this week, if children test positive on an LFD, they do not need to get a PCR. Children who test positive on an LFD should not come to school and we ask that you contact us before bringing your children back to school.
- Contact tracing continues to be problematic, therefore we will continue to let you know if there is a positive confirmed case, as we did last term. As we remain in class bubbles, if a positive case is confirmed in your child's class, it is recommended that you test your child with an LFD for seven days. (Last term a number of asymptomatic children were identified as positive cases just through doing an LFD when families knew there was a positive case in the class—so we know this helps to identify cases and manage transmission).
- With the isolation period being reduced in some cases, we now ask that you communicate with us before sending your child back to school. Guidance is now that you may be able to end self-isolation before the full 10 days based on the following;
 - ⇒ You can take an LFD test from 6 days after the day your symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if you did not have symptoms), and another LFD test on the following day. The second LFD test should be taken at least 24 hours later. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result.

If individuals are ending their self-isolation early (before 10 days), official guidance advises that they avoid close contacts, which is of course difficult to do in classrooms. Therefore, I ask that you speak with myself (or Mrs Cooper or Mrs Flower in the office) before sending children back to school before the 10 days isolation has finished. This enables us to risk-assess alongside our overview of cases within school.

Finally, if you haven't done so already, please order a number of LFD tests for your household in the event that we do experience another outbreak, and your child is identified as a close contact. Do let us know if you need one and have been unable to source any and we will endeavor to help.


Slindon Primary School Proposed Library Design

centenary of the Friends of the South Downs, formerly, the South Downs Society, and previous to that, the Society of Sussex Downsmen. The successful bid and subsequent project allows our children to be involved in 'South Downs for All: Schools Heritage Project', experiencing heritage workshops, field visits and many more activities working with experts within the South Downs National Park.

I look forward to sharing more with you about this. It feels fantastic to be able to put Learning Outside the Classroom (LOtC) back at the core of our curriculum with this project, after the challenges that Covid has brought over the last couple of years.



Please be mindful of how cold it is in school— just as it was last year, with the exception that at this time last year, many of the children were learning remotely, so may not have

experienced the school being quite so cold. Throughout the Coronavirus Pandemic, I have communicated that all doors and windows need to remain open and so of course, in the darkest depths of winter it is particularly cold.

Each classroom has an electronic device which measures temperature, air quality and carbon monoxide emissions. This ensures that the teachers can monitor air flow and temperature, but it is cold in school.

Please encourage your child to wear additional layers if they are feeling the cold. We have a large amount of second hand uniform in school if you would like to ask about additional clothing for your child/ children. We would all like to say a heartfelt thankyou for the Christmas gifts that families gave at the end of last term. We are always incredibly grateful for your kindness and generosity.

Please know that whilst giving presents to staff is truly appreciated, we never want families to feel that they ought to do so, just because other families do. I worry sometimes that it has become expected, but it certainly isn't from us here at school.

Personally, my favourite thing to receive is a card with words of kindness and appreciation.

These are kept by teachers forever (and make our eyes red and watery!)
