Ten Pieces aims to open up the world of classical music to 7-14 year olds across the UK and inspire them to develop their own creative responses to the music.



A new resource, **BBC Ten Pieces at home** provides weekly activities for primary schools, home educators and parents to share with their students. Each includes a Ten Pieces film to watch and enjoy and a linked creative activity that can be completed by children at home without any special materials or preparation.

A collection of 100 classical music recordings, together with learning activities and background information on each piece, is being offered free of charge to families during the coronavirus crisis.

Comprising music from Decca Classics' catalogue, Classical 100 was originally devised as a free primary school resource, developed by exam board ABRSM in partnership with Classic FM. The Classical 100 pieces can be sorted according to mood, instrument, tempo and historical period and are designed to support learning at Key Stages 1 & 2 of the National Curriculum.
