Class Bubbles



We started the beginning of term with two 'bubbles', one as Catkin Class and the second as both KS2 classes- Acorn and Chestnut Classes. On Monday, we made the decision to increase our preventative measures, in light of the rising cases of Coronavirus, both locally and nationally.

For Acorn and Chestnut Classes, this means that the playground and field will be divided in half, to enable each class to remain in separate bubbles at playtime and lunchtime. These classes will no longer share spaces such as The Glade and the Library.

Staff will remain in their bubbles with the exception of Joe Coyle, who will continue to work with all classes during PE and outdoor activities. Mr Coyle will keep 2 metres away from children in Catkin and Chestnut Classes, to ensure that he does not risk possible transmission of the virus. Mr Mayne will also continue to keep within social distancing guidelines when he is working with the staff and children in

Acorn Class on a Friday morning.

You may have seen that staff in a number of local primary schools are wearing masks or visors for particular points of the day. This will of course depend on and vary, according to each school's context, building and Risk Assessments. At the moment, we don't feel it is necessary to wear either but staff do have the option to, should they feel it necessary.

If members of staff do decide to wear either a mask or a visor, we will let you know so that you can discuss it with your child/ children, should you feel the need.

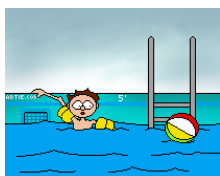

Swimming

In that uncertain climate, we decided that we would not book the coach and swimming pool sessions and instead, focus on more time learning outdoors, where we know there is also less risk of Coronavirus transmission.

Curriculum

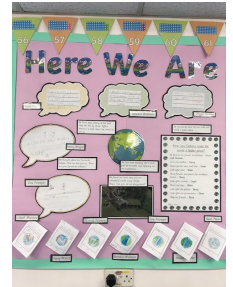


As you know, the whole school have been learning through Oliver Jeffer's beautiful text 'Here We Are', for the first two weeks of term. I hope to video the precious, insightful work that the children have produced and which is displayed in each of their classrooms.

As we move on to the planned themes of learning for the remainder of the term, I want to share with you how we plan to address the gaps that the children will inevitably have in their learning, after such a long time away.

In Catkin Class, the children have been getting to know each other, the staff and the routines. They have been making the most of the beautiful weather we've been

having throughout September, learning and playing outside.



In Key Stage 2 (Acorn and Chestnut Classes), each morning is structured so that the teachers can teach each year group separately in Maths. So for example, while Miss Heater is teaching Maths with Year 3, Year 4 are with Mrs Redman or Mr Coyle in the library and are practicing spelling Common Exception Words, working on SPAG (Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar) activities or Times Tables Rockstars. These groups then swap over and the class comes together for English before the end of the morning. This morning routine is the same in Chestnut Class.

In the afternoons, Acorn and Chestnut Class are 'blocking' their wider curriculum subjects. Chestnut Class have recently finished afternoons of Art throughout the week and Acorn Class have been enjoying their first RE topic about reconciliation. Both staff and children are really enjoying this new structure to the week. The afternoons are a great balance to the structured mornings.



In all of the classes, the teachers are now gently assessing where the children are in their learning. They are doing this in a number of ways, appropriate to the ages and stages of the children. This early assessment is so important to allow us to provide the right level of learning for your child/ children. Once the teachers are confident that the children have settled in, and secure with where each child is in their learning, we will begin to send books and home learning home.

The teachers will feedback to you where your child/ children are in their learning, how they have settled back into school and how both school and home can best work together for the benefit of each child.

Next week, Ivy will spend a little more time out and about around school at different times of the day, as she has begun to this week. In order to become the best school dog, Ivy needs to learn to focus on me and her training.
