

All about Ivy The School Dog




Do I lay down on the bed or put it over me?

But I really think that once you come back, you will be so pleased to see your friends and your teachers (who have missed you so much!) Things are only a little bit different and we are doing all the right things at school to make sure that it feels back to normal.



Would you believe that after the summer holidays , every year in September, the teachers always feel a little nervous? Sometimes they worry that they've forgotten how to teach! But it only takes an hour or so and they remember what great teachers they are. I have written some helpful information for you below for each class to know the important bits. And I have written a long letter to your adults at home (with no fun pictures of Ivy or anything), because they are the ones who have to remember it all! But it helps if you do too!



Everybody except the new Reception children will come to school on Friday 4th September. Each class will arrive at different times and I will be right there at the gate, with other staff to welcome you and see you in.

You need to wear your school uniform and a big smile and we will be ready to welcome you back!

Children in Catkin Class

On Friday 4th September (your first day) , you will come to school at 9 o'clock. You will have Mrs Willis in your class as your teacher. Mrs Mayne will still be there with you and you will also have Mrs Merret, your new teaching assistant (Mrs Mayne and Mrs Merret will be there everyday). It will just be the children in Year 1 and Year 2 on your first day, so you can get to know the new adults in your class. Mrs Willis has planned lovely things for you to do, you are going to have the best day!

When you come back on Monday after the weekend, you will meet your other new teacher Mrs Souadi and a few new Reception children will start that day too. I know you will be so kind to them and make them feel very welcome.

Your class is very special as you are the only class who will come into the school through the playground (like you always did). The adults have to keep 2-metres apart but you can say goodbye to them when you're ready in the playground and come into class. Then the fun starts! Your classroom looks the same as it did but it's been painted and your teachers have made it look lovely!

Children in Acorn Class

On Friday 4th September (your first day) , you will come to school at 9.15 through the main front door. You can say goodbye to your family in the car park at the front of the school and come on in! Miss Heater is so excited about seeing you all again! Mrs Redman has missed you all too, she will be with you in the morning. In the afternoon you will have Mr Coyle with you as your teaching assistant. I bet Miss Heater and Mr Coyle have a lovely game for you to play outside in the afternoon.

Your classroom looks mostly the same but we have arranged the tables in rows. When I first heard of that idea, I didn't like it. BUT it looks so cool and all the children who have been in schools over the summer term have loved sitting in rows!

When you come to school from Monday 7th September, you are the only class who will carry on coming in through the front door (that means you'll probably get a sneaky peak at Ivy first thing– I expect she'll be waiting to see you from behind the baby gate on my office door!) You will come in a little earlier at 8.45 and settle at your table om your classroom.

You are going to love all the exciting things planned for Acorn Class this year– especially working with Mr Mayne on a Friday morning! He does such cool things and it's always outside. Miss Heater and Mr Coyle will also want to join in with you.

Children in Chestnut Class

On Friday 4th September (your first day) , you will come to school at 9.30 through the main front door (I thought you'd like a little bit of a lie-in!). You can say goodbye to your family just as you get to the car park gate and then come through the car park and the main front door. Mrs Tully and Miss Hawkes have missed you and can't wait to welcome you all back– especially the Year 5 children who they haven't seen for a long time!

Your classroom is also arranged with the tables in rows. The Year 6's loved the different layout of the class when they spent the last 5 weeks of the summer term in school.

When you come to school from Monday 7th September, you are the only class who will come through the school gates on your own and walk through the Glade door, into your classroom. You will come into your class from 8.40am and settle into some independent learning or read a fantastic book while Mrs Tully prepares the day's teaching.

We have big plans for you all this year– now you are the oldest children in the school!

PE for all classes

All classes will have PE on a Tuesday this year. You will also now come to school ready for PE (so we won't be changing at school anymore). You'll need to keep an eye on the weather, if it's colder wear tracksuit bottoms or leggings and if it's warmer wear your shorts. You can still wear your PE T-shirt and your school jumper. You are going to love PE with your teachers and Mr Coyle this year!
